



#### **Tell us about AAHAA**

AAHAA grew out of a need to help people struggling to connect to healthcare. In September 2011, a meeting was held as part of a Healthcare Needs Assessment at the request of the Healthcare Foundation of Northern Lake County. In attendance were representatives of HFNLC and the community, including individuals from local and county government, schools, fire and rescue services, the local food pantry, faith-based organizations, and residents. The Antioch Area Healthcare Accessibility Alliance (AAHAA) was created as a result of that meeting with the goal of addressing and resolving the access issues faced by the residents of Antioch. The organization is focused on how to collaborate with local and county partners to meet the immediate and ongoing healthcare needs of the uninsured, underinsured and medically underserved residents.

#### What are AAHAA's programs/activities?

We focus on the underserved populations of the elderly, veterans, chronically ill and youth, but we will help anyone experiencing an issue accessing healthcare. We plan to increace access of residents to broader Lake County resources by providing referrals and connecting them to partner organizations.

Our Network Nurse Program consists of direct oneon-one visits with our clients, either in-person or via the phone. This helps to improve residents' opportunities to interact with a nurse who can address their healthcare. social service, mental health and transportation needs. We offer community outreach programs like our "Talk to a Nurse Series" in low-income and senior buildings that provide residents a 15-minute meeting with a nurse to discuss health concerns. After the meeting, we schedule follow-up appointments to offer more help. We also provide Certified Application Specialists to assist individuals with enrolling for insurance through the ACA (Affordable Care Act), Medicaid, SNAP, Medicare Savings Plan and other resources based on their individual eligibility. Our Health Literacy Series sponsors educational activities where Antioch residents can learn about healthcare topics. Our transportation program improves residents' opportunities to access transportation services to get them to and from healthcare appointments.

#### How does AAHAA impact the community?

AAHAA creates a healthier community by helping all our residents find and connect to the resources they need for better health.



#### What's your favorite AAHAA memory?

When we were struggling financially and our board of directors came to the rescue and pulled together a phenomenal event to raise the funds we needed.

## Where do you see AAHAA going in the future?

Expanding our reach to help even more people find the resources they need to live healthier lives.

#### It might surprise you to know...

I have panned for gold in Telluride, Colorado. I was a volunteer Ambassador for the Association of Nonprofit Executives who travelled to South Africa to work with NGO's in Cape Town and Johannesburg. I have camped in the desert to watch a meteor shower. And I love storytelling festivals.

#### Favorite memory about the community?

The way everyone came together during the COVID-19 pandemic to help one another.

#### **Greatest lesson you've learned?**

Most people want to do good things in life — some just need a little more direction than others.

## D117 & Local Businesses Join Forces to Benefit Transition Students

pring is a time for celebrating in District 117! While most of our celebrations over these spring months are focused on our students, we also take time to recognize our community partners who provide opportunities for our students beyond the walls of our facilities. During April and May, the Community High School District 117 Transition Services Department is celebrating the community partners that enable high quality, workbased learning for students.

The Transition Services Department is responsible for ensuring that students leave high school prepared to reach their fullest potential, specifically in the areas of employment and independent living. For some students, this includes vocational training following high school coursework from ages 18-22. This year, the program supports 11 students, pairing them with local businesses to learn about workplace expectations, customer interactions, and being a positive co-worker.

The work-based learning program has been operated by the Transition Services department since 2016. While Community High School District 117 is appreciative of all its partners, both past and present, the district looked to pay special recognition to four of our active, long standing partners. These include Walgreens of Antioch, Piggly Wiggly of Antioch, Antioch Pizza (Rt. 59 Branch), and Daisy's Artish Cafe of Lake Villa. Through partnership with the program, both Walgreens and Piggly Wiggly have converted students to employees on their teams.

I recently had the opportunity to join the leaders of this program in a visit to each site to deliver a special plaque as a token of gratitude and appreciation for their continued support of students and staff. During these conversations, I was especially impressed by how well the business leaders had gotten to know our students and the care they showed for always finding new opportunities for them to learn and grow as employees.

As we drove around to our visits, I asked the staff members who make the program possible to share some quotes that we include in this article for Connections readers. Andrew Seketa, District Transition Services Coordinator said "We couldn't do it without the businesses. The authentic, hands-on experience is something you just can't replicate in a classroom". Christine Gialo, District Vocational Facilitator said "We really appreciate the partnership. They're so supportive of our program, and the students learn a lot from the experience".



## **Antioch Opens Bid Process for Park Development**

The Village of Antioch has announced the request for sealed bids for the construction of the Downtown Community Open Space Redevelopment Project, Contract 2 2023. The project aims to transform an existing site of approximately 4.5 acres into a new park with an emphasis on the Sequoit Creek channel.

This development project will provide a major boost in tourism and economic development opportunities for the Village of Antioch. The park will include the installation of stone walls, a cast-in-place pedestrian bridge, sanitary sewer, storm sewer, water/sewer service lines, electrical and lighting improvements, concrete walkways, decorative walls, irrigation, and landscaping. Additional features will include a splash pad, playground equipment, and a pavilion, alongside the reconstruction of Depot Street and a restroom/concession facility.

Antioch Mayor Scott J. Gartner says the request for bid proposals is another big milestone forward for this landmark project. Preliminary environmental construction began last fall. Park construction is expected to begin later this summer.

"This redevelopment project is a significant investment in the heart of our village. It will provide a space for residents to gather, relax, and enjoy the natural surroundings," said



Gartner. "We look forward to reviewing the bids and seeing this project come to fruition."

This Project is supported, in whole or in part, by federal award number SLT 3381 awarded to the State of Illinois by the U.S. Department of the Treasury. Therefore, bidders must comply with all laws, including those related to the employment of labor and payment of the general prevailing rate of hourly wages in the locality in which the work will be performed.


## Senior Discounts Available to Residents 65 Years or Older!

Did you know that Village of Antioch residents 65 and older are entitled to a discount from the Village's contract waste hauling service? Senior discounts of 20% are available for qualifying residents.

Seniors are also eligible for a discount Village vehicle tax.

Seniors 65 and older only are required to pay \$1 annually per vehicle, a 90 percent discount from the regular tax of \$10 per vehicle.

To qualify for either discount, residents must be registered with the Village. To verify senior status, contact Antioch Village Hall at 847-395-1000.






## **Our Community's Heroes**
