


### **AREA MAP**


# Connecting **Through** Relationships

### W.C. Petty Zones in on Relationships

Pelationships are the key to building a solid foundation for learning. W.C. Petty showcased relationship building during the school year and looks forward to continuing relationship building in the 2021-22 school year!

Devan Hope, one of our 3rd grade teachers, focused on the Zones of Regulation

with her students each morning. Zones of Regulation is a framework for students to identify their current social/emotional zone in order to regulate their feelings, emotions, and energy needs. Mrs. Hope gave each student a small sheet of paper correlating with the zones and students would mark down where they felt they fit that day. Students are also given an opportunity to write why they feel that way to provide context for Mrs. Hope for necessary conversations as needed. It would also provide her with additional information about how she can best approach any student that

Another teacher, Kathy Niemi, utilized "Think Outside the Box Thursday". During morning meetings, Mrs. Niemi would put up a picture that looked like part of something

day. Students were able to check their "zone" through-

and the students would finish the picture. For example, these came from the start of a butterfly picture. Students express their creative sides while sharing their thoughts with the class and making personal connections with

their classmates throughout their drawings.

District 34 has adopted Restorative
Practices (RP) to work in conjunction
with our PBIS framework. RP is a
method of building community
and belonging within our school
which will in turn decrease

misbehaviors while highlighting positive behaviors. As situations come up, it also aids in repairing and restoring relationships through "circles." Our students and staff sit in a circle and articulate personal feelings and experiences in a process that informs participants in empathy and understanding. Circles are run in the classroom, at recess, in

are run in the classroom, at recess, in the office, and during staff meetings. RP provides a consistent process for addressing any issue from community building, daily behavior/ emotional needs, and more significant situations. This is an

area we have begun training in and will continue with a new cohort this upcoming school year.

The AUGS staff could not be more pleased to have the opportunity to start building positive relationships with the incoming 6th grade students and to help them make a smooth transition to a new school, make new friends, and begin wonderful middle school memories.







## **Building Relationships in the Early Childhood Classroom**

Teachers and parents see

children working together

Achild's social skills, emotional state, and sense of value affect his or her academic learning. Yes, it is important for children to learn their letter sounds, count, and identify numbers. But it is also important for children to learn how to build relationships. In our preschool classrooms we help children establish secure relationships with adults and help them learn how to:

- ▶ Help, share, and work together in a group.
- Take turns.
- Participate in activities with the class.
- Trust and respect responsible adults.
- ▶ Engage and communicate with teachers and students.
- Develop friendships with peers.
- Cooperate with others.

▶ Be mindful of people and of the classroom environment.

Because building relationships is at the center of each of our classrooms, the quality of student-teacher interactions and academics improves. Teachers and parents notice children using kind words with each other. They see children working together as a team towards common goals and there is a decrease in aggressive behaviors and negative attitudes. There is an overall improvement in the

classroom climate and academics and school readiness also increase.

Each of our classrooms implement a curriculum embedded with building positive relationships into everyday play and learning. Teachers lead group discussions, model, and practice building relationship skills such as how to kindly

> get a friend's attention, how to take turns, and how to solve friendship squabbles. These opportunities to learn and practice within each day help children connect with others, disengage stress, and commit to making positive, kind choices.

Parents can help their children build relationships by doing the following:

1. Spend uninterrupted time

as a team towards common goals and there is a decrease in aggressive behaviors and negative attitudes

together each day

- 2. Encourage communication and expressing feeling
- **3.** Respect their feelings
- **4.** Allow your child to play with other children
- 5. Limit screen time

You can use the given tips to effectively allow your kids to communicate, respect, and have a balanced relationship at every age.

### **Hurricane Huddle's Focus on Restorative Practices**

In spite of all of the challenges of the pandemic and its impact on the 2020-2021 school year, D34 and Hillcrest Elementary School remained committed to forging and strengthening relationships. With professional development focused on Restorative Practices, both staff and students spent valuable time engaged in activities designed to promote connections and building community. During class meetings (dubbed "Hurricane Huddle" time) and at various points throughout the school day, students and staff could be found "circling up," as the circle is one of the main components of Restorative Practices. As one educator and researcher writes, "an effective and meaningful path to both community and communication in my classroom is circle practice, inspired

by Restorative Justice...I want my classroom to be a place where students want to be, a place where they feel safe and loved and valued. And I want it to be filled with student voice—I want them to tell their stories. These two qualities are inextricably linked: When students belong, they open up, and when they open up, they belong" (Davenport, 2018).

At Hillcrest Elementary School we also remain committed to providing an environment where students "feel safe and loved and valued." As we approach the new school year with excitement, we are determined and devoted to continuing to grow our circle practices and ensure that our Hurricane family feels connected, supported, and eager to make the 2021-2022 school year the best one yet!



# Antioch Gets a Facelift

Downtown Antioch is getting a new streetscape with new lighting, land-scaping and wayfinding signage as well as public space improvements

he Village is excited to be working with the nationally recognized, Lakota Group, on a new "Downtown Beautification Plan" for Downtown Antioch. Lakota was hired by the Village Board in early 2021 to come up with a series of proposals to improve the physical appearance of Downtown Antioch, including a new streetscape, lighting, landscaping, and wayfinding signage. The Village Board has also identified several areas for new public space improvements, including the property at the southeast corner of Main and Depot, Toft Street, and the underutilized alleys that dot the Downtown.

With the recent purchase of the vacant property at the intersection of Main and Depot Street, the Village Board envisions the creation of a new public gathering space for the residents of the Village. Over the past number of months, Lakota has been gathering the opinions of the residents on what they envision for these public spaces. Ideas for the property have ranged from restoring the natural creek that once flowed through, to creating a new gathering space for public events. Over the next several months, Lakota will be working on concepts and drawings on various placemaking ideas of how these public spaces can be improved.

The Village recognizes the importance of great placemaking and building off the existing charm of Downtown Antioch. Many of the concepts that will be proposed will be displayed at the Fall Wine Walk on September 25th, 2021. Lakota and the Village will be hosting a tent for the public to drop by and look at some of ideas related to this beautification project, so, please make some time and stop by the booth at the corner of Toft and Lake.

The Village of Antioch has started a new chapter in historic preservation with five community members being appointed to the Village's Historic Preservation Commission (HPC). Ainsley Wonderling was appointed as the chairperson, along with Kacey Stevens, Kelly Nawrocki, David Cornes, AIA, and Margaret Cole. Working along with resident and property owners who have an interest in preserving the historic fabric of the Village, the HPC hopes to start the process of surveying the Village's historic stock of buildings. Many of the historic buildings along Main Street and residential streets around the Downtown have defined the character of Antioch for generations but have lacked any form of protection. The goal of the

Historic Preservation Commission is to work with property owners in landmarking and preserving their buildings for future generations.

Along with the extensive investment that the Village has made in its successful "Façade program" which encourages building owners to restore their buildings, landmarking buildings can have tax benefits, and the commission wants to educate the public on the financial benefits that landmarking your building can have. In addition, the commission is looking for information on the history of the numerous historic buildings scattered throughout the Village, including the families that lived there, the businesses that once occupied the space, along with historic photographs.



With the great work that the "Lakes Region Historical Society" has been doing for many years, the Antioch Historic Preservation Commission, for the first time will have the power under the Antioch Historic Preservation Ordinance to work with willing property owners who would like to landmark their buildings. The hope of the committee is to landmark several important buildings over the next number of years and start a new tradition of preserving the very best of Antioch.

# **Reestablishing Routine at Lakes Community High School**




# Speaquoits Lead the Way



# NEHS Students Build Pumpkin Patch

School, renovation of teacher and students' classrooms and working spaces, new flooring at Hooper, Martin, and Palombi Middle School, various ADA improvements, HVAC equipment replacements at Hooper and Palombi, and roof replacement at Martin Elementary. ### **Technology Upgrades for LV41**

ver the course of the last 18 months, Lake Villa District 41 has been evaluating and installing much needed upgrades to our classroom technology to follow our student 1:1 Chromebook program. With most classroom technology at over eleven years old in-district, we are excited to welcome students and staff back this fall at Lake Villa District 41 schools with updated technology. As we continue to improve academic achievement for all students, we look to technology as a catalyst and tool to empower and inspire students to learn, lead, and serve.

Previously, classrooms were equipped with a projector, Smartboard, desktop, monitor, and speaker. The District 41 Technology Committee worked to find a system that reduces the equipment complexity and their differentiated issues and offers a simplified teaching platform. Our updated learning environments will provide staff and students with more ways to creatively interact with their curriculum, reduce complexity, and increase functionality, as well as, useability on a daily basis.

Teachers will have daily access to an interactive panel with integrated speakers and an attached Chromebox, which runs the same operating system used throughout the district. The new system is attached to a height adjustable mounting apparatus that can accommodate a variety of heights, ages, and abilities, all with the touch of a finger. During the 2020-2021 school year, Lake Villa District 41 purchased Logitech webcams and stands to aid staff with remote teaching. These devices have been incor-



porated into the new system and can be used as a high quality document camera, to facilitate multi-classroom live interactions through Google Meet, or facilitate remote learning should the need arise in the future. To complete the updated classrooms, all classrooms will have dry erase boards, which were chosen to blend traditional teaching tools with the modern panels for additional flexibility.

The panels are to be installed over two phases, and should be completed for the start of the 2021-2022 school year. It is our hope and goal that we have come together to give educators and students flexibility to redefine their classroom experiences for the 21st century, while maintaining what we already know, that achieving excellence takes everyone, and our staff is excellent!
