



Sharing Facilities & Embracing Opportunities

istrict 117 includes two incredible high schools, Antioch and Lakes. Both schools have established traditions of success in the classroom and on the field of competition. For many years both ACHS and LCHS have shared resources to enhance the overall experience for all students across the district. These shared resources have been on full display throughout the first months of the 2021-2022 school year. The D117 tennis complex has played host to multiple tournaments, conference championships, and IHSA state series events. The new D117 field house has provided safe practice areas for programs from both schools throughout the fall during inclement weather episodes, on top of playing host to 2 major girls' volleyball invitationals. The ACHS field turf has been utilized by LCHS programs for practices and competitions.

While the sharing of facilities is well known in athletics, it is important to note that clubs, activities, and fine arts also share spaces and resources. The highlight of these being the new professional recording studio located at ACHS that students from LCHS can also utilize.

Sharing of facilities is not the end but rather the beginning of providing opportunities to all students across D117. Our schools have increased access to multiple student opportunities during the first semester. We created a district wide archery club. The club, which started at LCHS a few years ago, was not offered at ACHS due to lack of robust student interest. The solution? Provide ACHS students wishing to participate access to opportunity and transportation. The result? 15-20 ACHS students travel to LCHS weekly to be part of the archery club. In the same vein, ACHS and LCHS have received approval from the IHSA to run a CO-OP speech program. This desire was driven by LCHS students wanting opportunities to be involved in a speech team that was not available at LCHS.

District 117 looks forward to enhancing opportunities going forward.

Monthly Leadership Workshops

igh School Conferences from throughout the state typically provide leadership training to a distinct group of student leaders chosen by coaches and teachers. These students join with other area high schools to engage in a half-day leadership conference, learning valuable tools to support and further their leadership qualities. With so many question marks at



the start of the school year, our Conference (the NLCC) cancelled their annual leadership conference for 2021-22. While this was disappointing, it presented an opportunity for D117 to find a solution and increase leadership training opportunities to a larger audience of district students. Starting in September at both schools, Coach Darnell Rios began working with both large and small groups of students. Coach Rios is a life improvement coach whose sole focus is helping people discover the best version of themselves. Some meetings are centered on motivation while others ask students to think deeply about broad-based questions, such as, "What is your Why?" The trainings will continue monthly for the remainder of the school year and are open to all D117 students.

Two LCHS Sports in the Hunt

The Lakes Girls Varsity Volleyball Team has used both their hard work and dedication on and off the court to fuel their success this year. They have won over 20 matches this season and took home the Regional Title on October 28 against number 3 seeded Carmel Catholic High School. Lakes moved on to compete in the sectional semifinal on November 1, defeating number 2 seeded, Deerfield. 25-22, 25-15. Lakes challenges St. Viator November 3rd for the sectional championship.

The Lakes Boys and Girls Cross Country teams have had a tremendously successful run throughout the state series. Both Boys and Girls finished in the top 5 during the Regional round. Becca Runyan and fellow junior Madison Perez were the first eagles across the line. Each earned personal bests which moved them to #7 and #8 all time in Lakes history. Runyan also earned All Regional honors with a 5th place finish. The boys were led by Micah Lind, Payton Whitehead, and Gavin Murrie. The tremendous trio ran fast enough to place #12, 15, and 20 all time in Lakes history. The dynamic duo of Runyan and Perez once

again led the way for the girls at the challenging Woodstock North Sectional. Up against 11 teams ranked in the state, the Lady Eagles finished a strong 4th, just 34 points from 1st. Behind Runyan and Perez, the team displayed quality pack running with sophomores Paige-Elicia Caruth and Madison Twarling, along with freshman Hannah Rojas making the difference and sending the lady eagles back to the state finals for the 3rd year in a row! The Boys team pulled off a stunner of epic proportions. Ranked outside the top 10, the team competed every step with pride. The trio of Whitehead, Lind, and Murrie started in last and moved up all race to finish in the top 30. Strong finishes from Jordan Hornbuckle and Quin Maloney earned the team 7th place and a qualification for the state finals by 1 point. As we often say in Cross Country, every place matters. This group believed in themselves, executed their race plan, and ran with so much heart. It is with great pride that for the first time in school history, the Lakes Cross Country team will be sending BOTH Boys and Girls to the IHSA State Finals!!

and during her 3 years at ACHS." We look forward to celebrating more student-athletes as the school year continues.



#9PMRoutine Daily Check Campaign

The Village of Antioch is encouraging residents to help combat suburban auto thefts and burglaries by participating in an evening routine of safeguarding personal property. The #9PMRoutine encourages a daily check of items just before bedtime. The campaign was created to educate residents about best safety practices, and help the community reduce preventable crimes.

Originated in Pasco County, Florida in 2017, the #9PM-Routine has been adopted on social media by law enforcement agencies across North America. The initiative offers a daily reminder for residents to:

- 1. Remove valuables from your car. (keys, wallets, cash, garage door openers, firearms, tablets, etc).
- 2. Make sure vehicle and home doors and windows are shut and locked. (Car doors, garage doors, etc).
 - 3. Turn on exterior lights.
- 4. "See something, say something." Residents who witness suspicious activity, are encouraged to call the Antioch Police Department dispatch at 847-270-9111. (Or, in the case of an emergency, 9-1-1).

Antioch Police Chief Geoff Guttschow says the department started to promote the #9PMRoutine hashtag on social media in early 2021. He feels now is a good

time to increase the visibility of the program.

"With thefts and burglaries involving unlocked doors becoming a higher-profile issue in our area, we wanted to remind residents that adding a few simples tasks before bed could help them from becoming a victim of crime," said Chief Guttschow.

Antioch Mayor Scott Gartner thinks the #9PMRoutine is a simple way to be proactive about crime.

"Many times, crimes involving stolen personal property are crimes of opportunity," said Mayor Gartner. "Often, these crimes happen because someone forgets to lock a car door. The #9PMRoutine is one more safeguard to make residents of Antioch less vulnerable."

The #9PMRoute continues to be promoted frequently on the Antioch Police and Village of Antioch Facebook pages.

Antioch Lions Club Donation Helps Fund First Responders

The Antioch Lions Club has made two significant donations to aid first responders in the Antioch community. The donations will be used to help fund protective equipment for Antioch Police officers and provide training equipment for the Antioch Fire Protection District. Lions Club president Kevin Fielder presented Antioch Police Chief Geoff Guttschow and Antioch Fire Protection District Battalion Chief Ryan Keefe each with \$10,000 checks at a ceremony in October.

Police Chief Guttschow says the police department will use the funds to help his goal of equipping each Antioch Police squad car with a ballistic shield for the officers. The shields will help significantly in officer response to dangerous situations, making it possible for them to arrive faster, and more safely.

"I am thankful to the Lions Club for the generous donation," said Chief Guttschow. "Our department currently has one shield that is several years old. With this donation, we will purchase seven more, in addition to two that we've already ordered, which will give us a total of ten. This provides critical protection for our officers.

Antioch Lions Club president Kevin Fielder says several

successful fundraising events for the club made it possible to fund the local donations.

"In addition to national initiatives for sight, hearing, and diabetes, we contribute locally," said Fielder. "Our organization wanted to find the best place to give money back to the community. The obvious first choices were the Antioch Police Department and Antioch Fire Protection District. Without their help, our club would not be able to put on the events that we do in our community. Our goal was to provide funding for non-budgeted "wish list" items."

Antioch Mayor Scott Gartner, who is also a member of the Antioch Lions Club, says the impact of the donations to the community is what drives Lions Club members to volunteer their time.

"This is what it is all about," said Mayor Gartner. "The fundraising efforts of the Lions Club and the generosity of our neighbors are making a substantial impact in making our community better."

This is the Winter issue of Connections, which means we're likely to be close to our first significant snowfall of the year (if it has not already happened).

During winter snow, the Antioch Public Works Depart-

ment provides snow removal within the Village limits with 2 crews plowing & salting 7 routes covering 120 lane miles with 103 cul-de-sacs. Plus, the Village crews are responsible for clearing Village-owned parking lots.

Depending on the snowfall, expected accumulation, and time of day, emergency and school routes will be

cleared first. The Village Public Works Department will do its best to get all streets plowed as soon as possible.

During snowfall of one inch (1") or more, parking will be prohibited on any Village street until snow removal operations have ceased.

property owner's responsibility to clear any portion of sidewalk on their property. According to Village code, sidewalks are to be cleared the lesser of seventy-two (72") inches or the full width of the sidewalk. Clearance of sidewalks should occur

> within 24 hours after the cessation of an event that deposits at least two (2") inches of snow. Also, remember to dig out your mailbox and clear snow away from fire hydrants on your property.

Accidents can happen. Any mailbox taking a direct hit from a Village of Antioch snowplow truck will be reimbursed up to seventy-five (\$75.00)

dollars if it cannot be reasonably replaced or repaired by the Public Works Department. Any damage resulting from the force of the snow will not be reimbursed. Mailboxes posts must be maintained and replaced if rotting. To help avoid the snow being plowed back into your driveway, move the snow to the right side of your driveway when facing the street in the direction of traffic flow.


PBIS Rewards points, which itself is cause for celebration.

Project-Based Learning

ducation is constantly changing to try and address real-world expectations and needs. There are new tools devised, and a constant change as to how teaching is being

delivered. One thing stays the same, students. Each student brings their own unique approach and questions to any given topic. How do we, as a district, harness this innate curiosity? District 36 is embracing 21st Century learning through real world problem solving. It's a program called Project-Based Learning (PBL). The district will begin implementation of this approach this year with a team of teachers applying this shift in learning.

Differences become quickly seen as the students take on the role of problem seekers. They tackle open-ended questions to get the

students engaged in deeper thinking from the start. From there, they work collaboratively gathering information needed to develop a project or performance to show potential outcomes or solutions. This involves students determining a plan, a timeline, and deciding what resources are needed to

provide a foundation for developing and completing their project. This leads to expanding their knowledge and skills by doing actively rather than passively.

Feedback and support happen throughout the project, helping students have a clear idea of expectations and learn to adjust and pivot towards the end result. Making the product public at the end increases communication skills, collaboration with authentic problems, and empowering students' imaginations, learning and personal growth as a priority. As our topics/projects unfold, we'll share the

creativity of the students and staff. Keep an eye out for our first PBL showcase in January.

Students Embrace Camp Duncan

00 of Palombi's sixth and seventh graders enjoyed an adventurous time at Camp Duncan this fall. Camp Duncan is much more than a place to take students on a field trip. It is a special place that gives students hands-on experience with nature through enriching activities in the outdoors.

Students participated in several team-building activities that fostered leadership, trust, communication, teamwork, and listening skills. This experience was the perfect complement to the district's Leader in Me program which promotes all students as leaders.

Facilities Improvements Continue

With the new bond funding of \$24.6M, District 41 began the first phase of the facility improvement and renovation projects in Palombi Middle School, Hooper Elementary, and Martin Elementary Schools. Taking advantage of no students in the buildings due to COVID, the work started earlier



and was completed on time and under budget. Among the \$10M of the improvements, the major ones included new roofs, HVAC updates and unit replacements with better air filtration systems, new generator for Palombi Middle School, instructional spaces renovations (new resource rooms and art rooms), and updated student and staff bathrooms.

The second phase of the facility improvements will begin in the Summer of 2022, and the planning is already underway. Improvements are planned at all four schools, including significant kitchen renovations and increased site lighting at both Palombi and Hooper. Hooper School will have parent and bus traffic pattern improvements to reduce congestion and increase student safety. Locker rooms will be renovated at Palombi, and the cafeteria will be slightly expanded. Thompson and Martin will have flooring and concrete replaced along with some classroom renovations. We are excited to continue with these much-needed upgrades, and we sincerely appreciate our taxpayers' support.

Lake Villa 41 Awarded Financial Recognition Status

The 2020/21 Fiscal Year for school districts ended on June 30th. Although it was a challenging year for the entire community because of COVID, one silver lining was an end-of-year solid financial position for Lake Villa 41. Because of the pandemic, the district received additional federal aid to allow the district to purchase necessary equipment and programs to sustain both remote and hybrid learning successfully. This fiscal year ended with a surplus of \$4,813,216 in the operating fund. Lake Villa 41 was once again awarded the state's Financial Recognition designation placing it in the highest financial strength category.

The last payment for the 20-year bond obligations was paid during 20-21. Even though the District took out new bond debt to fund needed facility improvements, homeowners with the average valued house will see over \$700 reduction in property taxes on their 2020 property tax bill.


