

Summer Events a Success

nother exciting summer in Antioch is winding down into what I expect to be an exciting fall in our village!

Our village staff worked tirelessly to put on events throughout the summer, such as the It's Thursday concerts at the bandshell. This year, we kicked off the Thursday night concerts by partnering with 95 WIIL Rock radio to put on a show that brought several thousand people to Downtown Antioch. The Royal Bliss show was more fun than we could have imagined. I don't have any details to share right now, but I can tell you that our staff is already working on next summer's concerts!

New this year, the village started our Food Truck FEAST-ival, held on the second and fourth Sunday of June through September. Our staff has worked to bring a variety of food trucks into Antioch for each event. In addition to the FEASTival, we also hosted Sunday children's concerts at the bandshell on the second Sunday of June, July, and August.

We have not only been busy with events, but the village has also been busy moving forward with our downtown redevelopment. At the end of July, the village broke ground with the environmental work at the village-owned property at Main Street and Orchard Street (the former Pittman Property site). This work sets the stage for the spring construction of a new park!

Antioch Public Works reminds residents, "No wipes down the pipes"

The Village of Antioch Public Works Department is making a push to remind residents that disposable wipes, paper towels, or items other than toilet paper, should not be flushed down the toilet.

Antioch Village Administrator Jim Keim says the reminder is being issued to prevent home plumbing problems, clogs in public sewer systems that could cause sewage backups into homes, and damage to the wastewater treatment plant and the environment.

Although items that are flushed down the toilet may escape a home's plumbing, the sewage blockages in the larger pipes can impact services for residents across the village. Flushing the wrong items can interfere with the maintenance of the village's sewer services.

"We have seen a significant increase in wipes and other items at our sewage treatment plant," said Keim. "We're making a plea to residents to help us keep the village's costs down by "tossing instead of flushing." Not only is it very time-consuming to remove these items from our system, but these items also cause damage that can be very expensive to repair."

Costs associated with the damage caused by the wrong

items ending up in the village's wastewater system are passed on directly to the residents in the village.

"When we think before we flush, not only are we potentially avoiding a mess literally and financially at home, but we're also helping the community as a whole save money," said Keim.

The ONLY items to be flushed are human waste and toilet paper. The Village of Antioch asks that residents do NOT flush:

- Wipes of any kind.....even if they are labeled as flushable
- Paper towels, napkins
- Dental floss
- Hair
- Diapers
- Cat litter
- Fats, oils, and grease
- Vitamins or any type of medications
- Sanitary napkins, tampons and applicators, condoms, Band-Aids
- Paint, stain, solvents, sealants, and thinners
 Please remember, "If you question it...... please
 don't flush it! Toss it!"

fter sitting dormant for years, the Village of Antioch has achieved a significant milestone in the redevelopment of the village-owned property at Main Street and Depot Street. The first physical construction work has started at the site. Preliminary environmental work started during the last week in July, setting the stage for park construction to begin in early 2023. By early 2024, the Village of Antioch will have a new park as a centerpiece to the downtown business district.

The demand for the redevelopment of this area has been echoed throughout the village for years. Early last year, the Village of Antioch acquired the remainder of the property needed for the park development. Once the property was acquired, the village engaged the Lakota Group, a planning and landscape architecture firm, to seek community feedback on the final use of the property. With community input, the Lakota Group worked to produce detailed conceptual plans for the redevelopment of the property as an open space with an exposed Sequoit Creek, with appropriate flood mitigation attributes and other attractive programming and park features.

"The physical work going on now is a big step forward for the project," said Antioch Mayor Scott Gartner. "Even though there won't be much physical work happening between now and next spring, there will be significant efforts going on behind the scenes with the numerous moving parts associated with the project."

Over the winter, the Antioch Village Board is expected to finalize design work for the park and obtain the necessary permits and approval needed to break ground. Since part of the project involves the re-opening of Sequoit Creek, numerous environmental and stormwater management processes are required. The current environmental cleanup and remediation are necessitated by the prior industrial use of the property.

Antioch Village Administrator, Jim Keim says the project would not be possible without the vision of the mayor and village board.

"Once complete," said Keim, "the site will become a major gateway and anchor to Downtown Antioch and an important new hub of Village life and driver of economic development for the community."

Antioch Police Warn Of Opioid Dangers

Antioch Police Chief Geoffrey Guttschow is alerting parents and residents about an alarming increase in instances of drug overdoses involving opioids laced with fentanyl. The uptick in instances of overdoses mirrors a growing problem locally, regionally, and nationally.

Since the beginning of this year, Antioch Police have responded to 14 reports of overdose victims. Of the 14 overdose calls, three of the victims died as a result of the overdose. Guttschow says the eleven victims who lived, were saved because every Antioch Police Officer carries an opioid antagonist, Narcan. When administered within a certain timeframe, Narcan will rapidly reverse an opioid overdose. Guttschow emphasizes that time is critical in the administration of Narcan.

"The quicker the response by first responders, the better chance of saving a life," said Guttschow. "That's why our officers carry Narcan, and every shift commander carries multiple doses."

Criminal drug networks are mass-producing counterfeit pills that look identical to common prescription and over-the-counter drugs. These fake pills have increasingly

become more deadly.

"These pills are falsely passed off as legitimate and are being sold online, via common social media platforms," said Chief Guttschow. "The criminals who manufacture these drugs include fentanyl to make the drugs cheaper to make, which also makes the pills more deadly. It doesn't take much fentanyl to kill someone. As a department, we are working hard to educate our community about these dangers. We're also warning the drug dealers that we're coming after them."

Guttschow says there isn't just one segment of the population that has been impacted. Recent overdose victims in the Village of Antioch range in age from 15 to 52 years old.

Through social media and other community outreach, the Antioch Police Department is working to educate parents and community members about the growing dangers of illicit opioids and other drugs. Through social media, the department is promoting the DEA's One Pill Can Kill initiative. The department is also working with several community groups on an upcoming event.







New & Improved Options for Seniors

he Township is using two locations to provide activities and programs for our Seniors. The Village Center (817 Holbek Dr. Antioch), formerly Senior Center, is a government building that is managed and maintained by the Village of Antioch and the Township Center (1625 N. Deep Lake Rd. Lake Villa) which is also a government building owned and operated through an intergovernmental agreement with High School District 117. Lake Villa Township and Antioch Township.

Antioch Township has allocated resources through a dedicated budget, using a small staff of part-time workers to continue to provide and grow our activities for our seniors. The Village has agreed to allow the Township, the first right, to use the Village Center for the senior daily activities that have been in place for many years. The evening and weekend use of the Village Center is managed by the Village's Park and Recreation Department on a first come first serve reservation process.

None of the long-term senior daily activities at the Village Center have been canceled or stopped. But a few activities' times and location were changed due to staffing and other planned uses of both the Village and Township Centers. Over the last 4 years, the Township has added programs and activities without deleting any of the historical senior center activities. We have worked diligently to build up our registration/membership list of seniors from 120 to now nearly 1,000 seniors to improve our communication channels and reach our growing senior population.

following brief interview.

Why did you choose education?

My college major was in history and I thought I might teach. I was not completely convinced that education was going to be my chosen profession because I did not know if I was ready for the monumental responsibility of teaching kids.

I tested the waters as a program aide at a therapeutic day school. My experience there set me on my path in education. The students that I had the privilege of working with, the collaboration among staff to provide supports, and the structure of the program gave me the confidence and foundation to manage a classroom.

I spent the bulk of my career as an eighth grade social studies teacher. Although I loved teaching, I was presented with an opportunity to broaden my sphere of influence as an assistant principal for the last three years. The administrative realm has given me a deep commitment to developing students who become invested in their school and prepared to be successful for each transition in their lives. Helping educators educate, students realize their potential and families connect with school has been the most rewarding parts of my career. Therefore, I am very much looking forward to having the opportunity to do the same at Emmons.



What excites you about being at Emmons?

There are so many things that excite me about Emmons. In addition to persevering students, a dedicated and collaborative staff, and a welcoming and supportive community, Emmons has a Board of Education that is committed to providing opportunities for our students and a superintendent that builds our capacity to fulfill our mission. But what I am most excited about is having the opportunity to bear witness to the growth of our students from kindergarten through eighth grade in a communal environment.

What are you passionate about in your work?

My passion for education stems from the mission of public education. The history of public education in our country is intertwined with the history of our country. The American Revolution was fought for the idea of a democratic government, and public education helps to develop citizens who can sustain it. This requires us to educate and nurture students to be informed and engaged. The best way to engage them is to provide them a voice. Everyone wants to be heard, and we should be developing students with the skills, dispositions, and confidence to effectively voice their unique perspectives. This led me to develop a student action committee and peer jury program at a previous district that gave my students opportunities to have a positive impact on the world around them. Behind the Scenes

When we think about public education, we often think of the teachers and students, the learning and curriculum, and the PTO organizations. While all those components are extremely important, there are many more people who work behind the scenes to get the school ready. For some school personnel, the summer months are their busiest time of year!

One of the hardest working groups in the summertime are the custodial staff.

They are the unsung heroes behind any school building. One of their main tasks is to remove all the furniture from each classroom and hallway, scrub the floor, and apply a new coat of wax. The staff also shampoos all the carpets, paints as needed, and makes repairs to any furniture or cabinets in each room.

This summer, Emmons has an excellent crew who has brought the building back to its pre-pandemic state. They take their jobs very seriously and understand the importance of their role in providing a safe, comfortable, and welcoming environment to those that come to our school. They feel that providing a positive first impression of the building is the most important part of their job.









Summer Facility Improvements

In March 2020, voters approved a \$30.7 million bond referendum to allow Lake Villa Community Consolidated School District 41 to pay for much-needed improvements for the maintenance and infrastructure of our District's schools.

Last year, many projects were completed in each of the four schools. Because of the age of the facilities, most of the work occurred at Hooper and Palombi schools. This summer, both schools renovated their kitchens and cafeteria

facilities to create more student space and update 50-yearold food preparation equipment. Additional lighting was installed in the parking lot areas. At Hooper, the entire bus lot and parent drop-off areas were reconfigured to facilitate the safety of students.

The Board of Education again would like to thank our community for investing in the education of our students and providing our excellent teachers with the best learning and teaching environment we possibly can.


