

District 117 reflects on Superintendent Dr. Jim McKay's 22 years of service

he end of the 2021–2022 school year is upon us, marking the final year of Dr. Jim McKay's service to the students, staff and communities of District 117. For the last 12 years, Dr. McKay has served as Community High School District 117 superintendent. But his journey has an educational leader in Northwest Lake County started two decades earlier. For 22 years, Dr. McKay has touched the lives of countless students, faculty and community members throughout his various roles in the District.

"Dr. McKay has served the district for 22 years, impacting every student he taught in his classroom and, as superintendent, every student in the district," said Wayne Sobczak, District 117 Board of Education president. "He's respected in all of our communities for his community service with our civic organizations and collaborative efforts with our villages, our townships and our local and county law enforcement. Dr. McKay is a leader who has one goal on a daily basis: to do what is in the best interest of our students. He will certainly be missed."





From Science to Superintendent

Dr. McKay began his tenure at District 117 in 2000 as a science teacher instructing chemistry at Antioch Community High School. He quickly rose through the ranks to become the science department chair and assistant principal.

After seeing significant growth in the Northwest Lake County area in the early 2000s, District 117 expanded, and in 2004, opened Lakes Community High School to a group of freshmen and sophomore students. Two years later, in 2006, Dr. McKay was named principal of Lakes Community High School, where he established many traditions that are still carried on today, including the Eagle Pride Monthly Celebration He also established the Lakes Eagles Booster Club which has given back to students annually since its inception.

In 2010, he began his stewardship as District 117 superintendent. When he accepted the position, he ensured the community of his plans by saying, "While a new person may be exciting, there is always a learning curve. In this situation, no valuable time will be lost."

That same year, he also communicated to District 117 stakeholders that he was "looking forward to continuing to develop and strengthen the district's academic programs in order to enhance student achievement."

Thank You, Dr. McKay

For more than a decade, Dr. McKay has done just this. From his various philanthropic efforts to leading his the district through the COVID-19 pandemic to working to establish both Antioch Community High School and Lakes Community High School as two of the leading public high schools in the state, Dr. McKay has been a leader both within the district and within the community at large.

"Dr. McKay's leadership and his passion for the improvement of our community will be felt for many years to come," said Andrew Seketa, district transition coordinator. "I consider it a privilege to have been able to learn from him as a student, a community member and eventual staff member. We all owe Dr. McKay a collective 'thank you' for his many years of dedication and service."

Part of Dr. McKay's work to further the reputation of District 117's schools could be found in the strategic plans he created. These plans subsequently led to expanding more opportunities for students to get involved in academic and extracurricular activities, both inside and outside the walls of the schools.

"Dr. McKay has provided our community with a strong sense of pride as we are now on the map as having a couple of the finest high schools in the state," said Mark Ring, LCHS PE chair and activities Director. "This will only bring more like-minded people to our community looking for a great education, propelling us to an even stronger community."

Jaclyn Orlov, ACHS's AP of curriculum and instruction, agrees.

"I feel fortunate to have worked with Dr. McKay during my 15 years in District 117," Orlov said. "Dr. McKay served as my principal and superintendent and in both of these capacities he has been a role model. He has always been present and supportive. Whether leading by example through a challenging time, or making appearances as a supporter at countless district events, you could always count on Dr. McKay to support the efforts of the district. It has been an honor to work with Dr. McKay, and I wish him the best in his retirement."

Welcome, Dr. Feucht!

Beginning July 1, Dr. Jeff Feucht will become the next superintendent of Community High School District 117.

An established leader in public education, Dr. Feucht currently serves as superintendent of Lake Park High School District 108 in Roselle, Illinois, and, prior to this, spent 11 years at Glenbard Township High School District 87 in Glen Ellyn, Illinois — the third largest high school district in the state.

"I am honored to have the opportunity to follow in the footsteps of an exceptional leader like Dr. McKay and am excited to get to better know the communities District 117 serves so I can hit the ground running on July 1," Dr. Feucht said. "I will work hard to preserve the tradition of excellence the district has become known for, while also continuing the emphasis on continuous improvement that will allow us to meet the needs of all of our District 117 graduates."

Dr. Feucht started his career at Elgin School District U-46 where he taught high school English and social studies for 11 years. He then served as a division chair at Bartlett

High School and led a large federal grant program for the district. Dr. Feucht received his Bachelor's degree in secondary education from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign where he graduated with high honors in 1998. He earned his Master's degree in Educational Leadership from Aurora University in 2001 and his Doctorate degree in Educational Leadership from Aurora University in 2011.

Dr. Feucht was selected from an applicant pool of 25 candidates from seven states which was assembled by BWP and Associates — the search firm hired by the District 117 Board to find the next superintendent. As part of the process BWP consultants met with Board of Education members, administrators, union leadership and district staff in addition to offering a community wide survey.

More than 235 participants took the survey, with the Board of Education and BWP consultants using the data to create a leadership profile to assist in the screening of applicants. Dr. Feucht emerged as the best match for the district and the leadership profile.

D117 Welcomes Two New Principals

ommunity High School District 117 is eager to announce Jori Bowen has accepted the position at Lakes Community High School as principal beginning the 2022-23 school year. Mrs. Bowen takes on this role after 7½ years as Assistant Principal of Curriculum and Instruction. Prior to her experience in this role, she was also an Assistant Principal of Student Services for two years and a Math Department Chair for 4 years. Mrs. Bowen began her career in the district as a Math teacher in 2002. "It has been a pleasure to work side by side with Mrs. Bowen over the last 18 years and I am proud that she is moving into the principal's role at Lakes." Principal David Newberry said.

Starting this fall, ACHS will have a new principal, Michael Berrie, coming to us from Round Lake High School, where he has served as principal since 2017. Prior to that, Mr. (soon-to-be doctor) Berrie was director of teaching and learning for Round Lake area schools. Mr. Berrie is currently in the process of finishing the research component of his doctoral studies with a dissertation entitled "Racial Identity





and Sense of School Connection in African American Males: A Narrative Inquiry." Coming from so close to Antioch, "I am very familiar with District 117 and its reputation for excellence," Mr. Berrie says, "and I feel confident that I can contribute to the district's continued success."

Hillcrest Teachers Take Advantage of the Summer

Our building itself will be undergoing some exciting upgrades, as we forge ahead with technology improvements. Over the summer, we are installing a new speaker system in our gymnasium, over a dozen new Promethean Boards in classrooms, and new monitors in offices to support small group learning. Teachers will also be plowing forward with their own professional development, and several are close to earning all of their Apple Learning badges and completing their Apple Teacher certification. ESSER to the Rescue

Thanks to Title I/ESSER (Elementary & Secondary School Emergency Relief) funding, Antioch Upper Grade School was able to offer a social/emotional support program, free of charge to students. The program was offered after school in 3 different 4–5 week sessions that addressed stress management strategies and healthy coping skills. It was a student driven program based on social/emotional concerns students may be dealing with such as peer relations, academic

pressure, self-esteem, anxiety, worry, etc. It was held in a smaller group setting and in a circle format to allow each student to have an opportunity to share or pass depending on their comfortability for the day. Students were identified and referred to the program based on teacher, parent, and/or self-referral and parents gave consent for their student to participate. Approximately 30 students participated in the program over all 3 sessions.













The Learning Never Stops

SSER funds were used to provide students with Extended Learning After-School Academic lessons within the areas of English Language Arts and Math. Antioch CCSD 34 elementary students engaged in meaningful, targeted instruction designed to secure skills and concepts. In addition to meeting with teachers for small group instruction, students participated in hands-on games and practiced skills with whiteboards and iPads. Students spent around ten minutes at each center and ended each after-school session with a Social Emotional Learning lesson. ESSER funds have helped to provide students with an enjoyable relaxing learning experience after school throughout the

entire 2021-2022 school year!

Extended Learning After-School has provided students and staff the opportunity to take advantage of any and all beautiful weather! Taking time to work outside allowed students a reprieve from their everyday learning environment and helped promote peace and relaxation. Within math, students worked on skills that matched their learning needs from number sense with our younger students, to telling time, multi-step word problems, fractions and multiplication/division with the older elementary students. Staff used educational videos, games and completing tasks to help review and confirm mathematical concepts.


Opening for Royal Bliss will be Lines of Loyalty, and Ignescent. The show will begin at 6 p.m. at the An-



While services will be managed by the Township government, the Senior Center building will still be owned and maintained by the Village of Antioch. Any non-senior services programming will be run by the Village of Antioch Park's Department.

"This joint effort will allow for better services with cost savings," said Antioch Mayor Scott Gartner. "This is a win for everyone, especially our seniors"

Antioch Township has been working on a revised senior program schedule that combines and includes the long-standing programs and activities that have been a staple at the Antioch Senior Center as well as the robust programs, trips, and events Antioch Township has created and grown throughout the past three years.

"One of the top priorities is to ensure our seniors have a safe comfortable place to gather, with the ability to create recreational activities for all," said Antioch Township Supervisor Tom Shaughnessy.

Antioch Senior Center building repairs: The Village of Antioch will temporarily close the Antioch Senior Center from May 2nd -June 6th for needed repairs and upgrades to the building.

Throughout the five-week closure, Antioch Township will continue Senior Center events at their 1625 N. Deep Lake Road, Lake Villa address. The Senior Center building is expected to re-open on June 7th with an updated schedule of events and programs that will be run both at the Senior Center and Antioch Township building.




