

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Board of Education Receives Recognition

From the desk of Superintendent Borowiak

Empowering Our Staff and Students to Be Proactive in School Safety

Antioch CCSD 34 values the safety and security of all staff and students, therefore our district utilizes the principles of ALICE methodologies to prevent, mitigate, respond to, and recover from a violent critical incident. ALICE stands for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate - the ALICE approach is an alternative approach to a passive lockdown method. It empowers individuals to make critical decisions during a crisis.

Over the past four years, Antioch District 34 employees have taken the ALICE Basic Certification eLearning course and completed hands-on ALICE training. We are proud to have fourteen certified ALICE Trainers across the D34 district (Tammy Johnson, Holly Kaprosy, Brad Rudd, Tina Bryk, Amy Pieniazkiewicz-Grude, Mary Marturano, Vasiliki Frake, Susan Harkins, Maria Treto-French, Andrea Meyer, Stephanie Siemens, Melissa Orozco, Ginny Smith, Mary Holsinger.)

This school year, we introduced each strategy to students using developmentally appropriate resources. Additionally, all drills are communicated ahead of time and NEVER include any sort of look-alike weapon or active simulation. Instead, training consists of scenario-based practice and age-appropriate discussion regarding how to respond during a critical event.

We also hosted our first Community Safety Information Night on October 3rd at Antioch Upper Grade School! At our safety night, we presented the District's Safety Plan, ALICE Training information, and offered breakout sessions on the following topics: Trauma, Bullying, Safety in Our Community, Cybersecurity, and Vaping.

Presenters included our local emergency response teams

including Officer Garcia from the Antioch Police Department, Detective Gomez from the Lake Villa Police Department, and Antioch Fire Department Fire Marshall Gibson who all took time out of their day to meet with our parents and talk about important safety issues in our community, in the homes of our students and their families, and

answer questions about how they work with the schools. The Lake County Community Youth Network presented useful data and strategies for families who have children who have experienced trauma or bullying. Carol Gudbrandson from the Cyber Crimes department of the Lake County State's Attorney Office talked to families about cybercrime, cyberbullying, cyber predators, and what families can do to help protect their children. Andy Duran from Linking Efforts Against Drugs (LEAD) addressed the major concern of vaping in schools and warning signs for parents and tips for handling children who are vaping.

Working to make our schools safe is an ongoing process that we continue to prioritize.

TURTLE UNIVERSITY PRESENTS:

Play, Learning and Preschoolers

This school year, the Mary Kay McNeill Early Learning Center is offering parents and families of preschoolers learning opportunities through our Turtle University. Throughout the school year, parents and families will have the opportunity to participate in workshops where they will learn strategies for engaging with their child as well as strategies to support their child's development.

On October 21st, the Mary Kay McNeill Early Learning Center hosted our first Turtle University workshop titled Play, Learning and Preschoolers. This interactive workshop included discussion on the different types and styles of play children engage in and the kinds of skills play helps to develop. Par-

ticipants learned strategies to support their child's cognitive, physical, social emotional and language development.

Future Turtle University workshops include Self-Care for Parents and Teaching Skills for Early Independence. Self-Care for Parents will focus on the ways that parents/guardians can help themselves maintain balance and energy while continuing to facilitate their child's growth and development. Teaching Skills for Early Independence will focus on the importance of starting early with all children, to promote self-esteem and motivation for independence. Tips and strategies for developing skills for independence in young children will be provided.



Hillcrest Expands Structured Learning Program

Hillcrest Hurricanes are going places this school year, and our Structured Learning Program is an integral part of our journey. Currently we have fourteen students in our program, and this year we added a third Structured Learning classroom. Jessica Retzke, our kindergarten SLP teacher, focuses on developing her students' language skills and providing structure throughout their school day. The students in her classroom use no tech, low tech, and assistive technology devices to communicate their wants and needs. She is working with Eleanor Murphy, one of our speech pathologists, to help our littlest students learn symbolic communication so they may be able to communicate not only with behavior and gestures, but with language. Each week students learn new words to expand their communication. One of the favorite core words of the week was "go." Students in the classroom experienced hands-on activities that involve the use of the word, such as watching balloon rockets launch in the classroom. This motivated the students to use the core word by rewarding usage with preferred sensory stimuli.

Kimberly Singh, the SLP first grade classroom teacher, loves bringing her students together every morning for morning meeting time (called "Hurricane Huddle" at Hillcrest). There they talk about the weather, sing and dance about the days of the week and months of the year, and count to 100 while exercising in fun and silly ways. Throughout the day, students work on playing together, taking turns, communicating, and regulating their emotions, in addition to learning reading and math. Students loved studying the life cycle of the apple, which was their fall social- science focus.

Rebecca Reidenga-Talbot, our 2nd-5th grade SLP teacher, is proud of the places her students are going and the gains they are making. Throughout her four years teaching the program, she reflects on how special it is to grow alongside her students since she has been able to spend multiple years with them. Looking back on pictures and memories with the kids from her first year reminds her how far they have come. "Another great thing about the program," she remarks, "is being able to work with so many different types of staff members, from related service providers to paraprofessionals." Mrs. Reienaga-Talbot understands that collaboration is essential to

meet our students' needs and appreciates the team's ability to think outside the box to support each student.

The related service providers include three speech language pathologists (Eleanor Murphy, Gail Lindstrom, and Colleen Green), two social workers (Tina Bryk and Kara Leitza), one occupational therapist (Malissa Roberts), and one physical therapist (Amanda Nauman). These women work diligently and creatively to foster student's skill development, and consider it a "gift" and a "privilege" to work with our kids and with each other, and to see the transformation the kids have made from the first day of school and over the years.

Malissa Roberts, occupational therapist, remarks on her work in the SLP program:

"My favorite part about working in SLP is learning to see the world through eyes and perspectives other than my own. Students have taught me so much more about empathy, creativity, compassion, acceptance, resilience and self-expression. I especially enjoy the moments general educational and adaptive education collide—the 'aha' moments when students realize we are really not all that different after all and the differences we do have are what make us unique and strong."

The SLP team would not be complete—and would not be able to function, without the tireless efforts of our special education assistants. These women—Erin, Shanda, Bobbie, Amber, Cathy, Gaby, and Kristina, in addition to the other paraprofessionals who help assist the students at specials and lunch/recess - Julie, Liz, and Denise, support the functional and behavioral needs of the students, assisting them in the classroom, bathroom, and all throughout the building. These women keep our students clean, safe, happy, and get them ready to learn. As special education assistant Bobbie Moore stated, "it's heartwarming and encouraging to see the dedication and love of the teachers, assistants, and paraprofessionals towards our kids with special needs at Hillcrest." As our Structured Learning Program continues to grow and to thrive, it is clear that all of our Hurricanes are going places. With love and with inclusion, we recognize that it's our differences that make us great. We are all part of the Hillcrest Elementary School family. We all matter.

W.C. Petty students love to have fun during and after school! With the help of adult sponsors, we currently are able to provide Diversity Club, Intramural Soccer, Intramural Yoga, Ukulele Club, Announcements Club, and Student Council.

With the leadership of Mrs. Pierce and Mrs. Jordan, our Diversity Club works together to explore student interests and understand how we can coexist in the world. The club began with the exploration of student similarities. Soon they will complete projects and create opportunities to learn about themselves and others. Petty Bobcats are proud of who they are and where they come from. Our Diversity Club also enjoys getting to know others!

Petty's Intramural Soccer program serves fourth and fifth graders. They work on passing and shooting skills. They are also learning the different positions of a soccer team. Last week a yoga instructor from Antioch's Trillium Yoga studio came out to do a class with the students. They are learning poses while exercising. Our yoga intramural students are gaining strength and flexibility. Props to Ms. Bender and Mr. Bieniek for making intramurals a success.

One of our newest clubs is the Ukulele Club and it has been running since September! Mrs. Schaibly shares her skills with the students in various ways. Last year the students enjoyed bucket drumming. This year, students have learned the basics of how to play the ukulele. They have learned the name of strings and strumming patterns for songs. In early November, the Ukulele Club proudly performed at the 5th grade music concert. It was awesome to see the musical growth of the students since September.

Another popular extracurricular activity at W.C. Petty is our W.C. Petty Morning Show. This club has 19 fifth graders involved in it and is run by two phenomenal fifth grade teachers. Students fill out an application to be a part of our morning show. The students meet once a week to record our morning announcements. Our announcements include: the date, the Pledge of Allegiance, a Moment of Silence, birthdays, what's for lunch, the weather, and student shout-outs from teachers. In addition, our Morning Show crew members try to inspire the rest of the students by offering motivational quotes, tips on how to follow our PBIS expectations, and new vocabulary. We are currently working with students on how to read the news fluently and using animated expressions.

Finally, our Student Council does so much for W.C. Petty. They help, encourage, and celebrate students and staff. Mrs. Jasinski and Miss Rieb focus on developing leadership skills for the 4th and 5th grade students. Student Council makes connections with and supports organizations in our community. So far this school year, they have organized a school-wide collection for the Antioch Traveling Closet, put together a school-wide Boo Gram event where students and staff can send a message to anyone in our school along with a sweet treat to be delivered on Halloween, helped make posters for the Boosters' Boo Bash, and organized a Red Ribbon week spirit week and door decorating contest to encourage students and staff to be drug free and celebrate life. Students create flyers, video announcements, and poster communications to share with students, staff, and families to advertise the events that they put together. 

At the beginning of the year, the LCHS Student Council embraced one initiative: Give back.

"They are really off to a great start this year," Lakes Activities Director Mark Ring said. "When they do these kinds of projects, they aren't out for themselves. This group, and in particular, Ms. Cross and Samantha are really out to help others."

In October, the student council banded together to make blankets for cancer patients. After seeing a friend and a family member undergo chemotherapy, Ms. Cross felt inspired to help. Then she saw her son's school was doing a drive to make baskets for chemotherapy patients, so she brought the idea to her own students.

"I approached our student council group, and they jumped on it. I mean, I was so impressed by how much they wanted to do. And no one batted an eye. Nobody said, 'No thank you. And we ended up putting together twelve different blankets in two weeks,'" Cross said.

Likewise, senior Samantha Skula is also no stranger to community service.

"For student council, we really wanted to focus on giving back, so we've been doing a lot of service-oriented proj-



ects, so when Ms. Cross came to us with this, we thought it would be fun and something that could really help out the community," Skula said. Because she is so humble, one might not necessarily know this about her. Skula is a member of five different clubs, each of which is geared toward community service in some capacity. As part of FCCLA, for example, she participated in partnering with Feed My Starving Children. She has made gift bags for custodians, helped out animal shelters as part of 'PAWS for Change,' and she sold trees alongside the Evergreen Club to offset the school's carbon footprint.

93 Students enrolled in Life Resource Management (LRM) and Personal Finance at Lakes Community High School participated in the Mock Interview Project on Thursday, November 3. Volunteers from the community reviewed students resumes, noted if students were dressed for success, and asked them a series of questions. They used a basic scoring rubric and provided feedback to students on how they did. The experience of a "real" interview was extremely valuable to our students as we often don't receive feedback on interviews. After the interviews concluded, volunteers participated in a brief open forum with students.


Lakes Fall Play Creates One of a Kind Experience for Audience

had a wonderful evening and a great week of festivities that surely left many memories for the students and staff.



Emmons Earns Exemplary Designation

The Illinois State Board of Education released its 2022 Illinois Report Card. The report card provides a detailed look at each school's progress on academics, student success, school culture and climate, and financial affairs. One component of the School Report Card is an overall designation based on overall performance. Emmons was designated with the highest rating: exemplary. Exemplary means that Emmons School's students are performing in the top 10 percent of schools statewide with no underperforming student groups. This is the first time in the history of the designations that Emmons has reached the highest level.



Emmons's success is a reflection of the innovative structure used during remote learning and the return to full-time in-person learning during the latter part of the 2020-2021 school year. It also is a result of an investment in increasing time during the school day for students to receive additional support in both math and ELA. The largest contributing factor to the students' success is the hard work of the teachers, staff, and families as they supported students through the pandemic and persisted when the students returned after remote learning. Teachers were able to build on the skills acquired during remote learning to advance the students at an accelerated rate.

Even though the Emmons community has faced serious challenges over the past few years and has made significant progress, there is still work to do. The administration, teachers, and staff continue to work hard toward helping all students reach their full potential.

Food Drive For Open Arms Mission

Emmons School in partnership with Emmons PTO held a food drive the week of October 17th with a culminating event day at Piggly Wiggly on Sunday, October 23rd. Many stakeholders of the Emmons community helped plan and execute the campaign. The PTO parents planned and participated on the Piggly Wiggly day and the 8th Grade House Leadership Student Team, led by Ms. Wickham, created signage and a video message to advertise for the drive. The students, staff, and parents helped pack up the food and deliver it to Open Arms Mission. Emmons collected 863 lbs. of food and over \$1000 in donations to benefit the community! Emmons Continues to Expand Opportunities for Students

During the 2019-2020 school year, the Emmons School community engaged in a year-long strategic planning process that resulted in 3 areas of focus: curriculum, character education, and program expansion. While all goals within the areas of focus are advancing, the program expansion initiative has been particularly successful. During the second half of last year, students were offered a variety of after school clubs sponsored by teachers and paraprofessionals. Students chose clubs covering a wide range of topics: drama, Legos, escape rooms, games, choir, community service, chess, cooking, and money management. The clubs went on outings, invited community members in, and held Lego build design competitions. The drama club concluded with a wonderful performance of the Wizard of Oz. These clubs are offered again this year. Students have the opportunity to participate in clubs during fall and spring sessions. This program continues to be expanded upon and allows students, staff, and parents to have a voice in which clubs are offered.

Another way that Emmons has expanded their programming is through diversifying electives during the school day. The students now have the opportunity to learn Spanish from 2nd-8th grade. A STEM class is arranged for 2nd, 3rd, and 7th graders. The 7th grade students are learning robotics by participating in the First Lego League and will compete in a competition in December. Students start band lessons in 4th grade from the beginning of the school year, much earlier than in the past.

Emmons School continues to find ways to create more opportunities for students. Whether it is events such as middle school dances and Parent Night Out events, or bringing speakers during the school day, students experience a well rounded learning environment at Emmons.

Hand-Painted Historic Ghost Signs in Downtown Antioch

The charm and history of Antioch have brought visitors to the downtown shopping district for over a century. This fall, the Village of Antioch unveil the Ghosted ghost sign project that celebrates the community’s history while spurring economic activity for the local business community.

With an eye on giving visitors one more reason to visit downtown Antioch, the GHOSTED signs are a hit! Earlier in October, Antioch Mayor Scott Gartner lead a ribbon-cutting ceremony to “unveil” the newest additions to downtown.

“In addition to educating our residents and visitors about Antioch’s history, these signs also provide one more reason

for people to visit our downtown business district,” said Gartner. “This was a project we started to work on about a year ago. I’m grateful for the hard work of the many members of the village board, staff, and outside organizations that worked together to make this project a success.” The mayor says he hopes to see more signs added in the coming years.

The Village of Antioch has partnered with the Lakes Region Historical Society to tell the story of historic downtown businesses. The Ghosted initiative includes preserving one existing ghost sign and creating a handful of new signs inspired by Antioch’s past.

Downtown Antioch

882 Main Street

This location has long been one of the first views of Downtown Antioch for people headed South on Route 83.

On September 15, 1969, the Village Board voted in favor of the addition of a new police department onto Village Hall on the west side of Main Street. Benes Construction of Antioch won the bid and the total cost for the development was \$47,500, which also included new sidewalks and landscaping.

The Antioch Police Department quickly outgrew this location, requiring a new station to be built at 433 Orchard Street. The new PD was dedicated in 1999. Soon after, the Antioch Chamber of Commerce moved into the 874 location and remains here today.

An ice cream parlor named Snow White’s was once located where the Village Hall is today. Back then people could sit on a swivel stool and take in the sights of Main Street while enjoying a frozen treat.

Williams Brothers Department Store



910 Main Street

In 1917, the Williams brothers, Daniel and Edgar, ran their store out of the King building at 904 Main Street.

In March 1891, the brothers opened a large, modern department store built immediately to the south at 910 Main Street. Together they operated Williams Brothers until 1921 when Daniel transitioned his share of the business to his stepson, Wilbur Reese Williams. The name changed to Williams Department Store after 54 years. Wilbur managed the business and after a time, his son, Harold Edgar, became a partner. Unfortunately, Harold was only with the company for under two years, dying at the age of 30.

Harold’s sons, Dean and Roger, were next to manage the store. Again disaster struck, Dean died in an automobile accident in August 1959 while driving his new Jaguar, leaving Roger to run the store.

Many other businesses operated at this location including Williams Hardware Store, True Value Hardware, and The Emporium Antiques. For more than 130 years, this location has offered Village residents and visitors the same staple items.





Reeves Drug Store

901 Main Street

After the massive fire of November 1903 destroyed much of the east side of Main Street, Gideon Thayer constructed a sturdy brick building at 901 Main Street.

By 1905, William and Alexander Gauger ran the Gauger Brothers store on the first floor, along with the Lux sisters, Ada and Minnie, who ran a photography business on the second floor. The Gauger brothers operated their business at this location until they left for California in 1913.

Sidney Reeves moved to Antioch from Chicago in 1919 for a pharmacist position at W.J. Richards Drug Store located at 928 Main Street. By 1921, Mr. Reeves had purchased the business. He moved the renamed Reeves Drug Store to the newly remodeled Thayer Building at 901 Main Street in April 1926. Mr. Reeves gifted free ice cream cones to 1st through 3rd grader students every Monday afternoon.

In 1941, the pharmacists, George and Helen Cribb Borovicka, purchased the business from 83-year-old Mr. Reeves. George and Helen hired another local female pharmacist, Edna Drom, to help run the store and it soon became affiliated with the Walgreens Agency. After George's death, Helen and Edna operated the business until the eighties with Helen's sister, Ruth Cribb Elliott. After the closing of Reeves Drugs in 1983, many other businesses have occupied this structure located in the center of town.



Gambles Hardware & Appliances

954 Main Street

954 Main Street was originally part of the Chinn and Rogers Block, which was destroyed in the 1891 fire.

In 1926, Walter Chinn built this modern building to house his confectionary store and newsstand, as well as the office of the North Shore Line which provided bus services to the Chicago, North Shore, and Milwaukee Railroad stations.

In 1934, Rudy Eckert opened his franchise hardware business, Gamble's Store, in this location which he ran for over thirty-eight years. It was known as "The Friendly Store."

The upstairs hall once housed the Old Fellows Lodge and Christian Science worship services were held on the second floor.

The Chinn Block has also been home to Foth Confectionary, Metropolitan Motor Coach offices, the Antioch News, Sonshine Books, and the Humidor among others.

This was the only ghost sign that was still visible at the start of this process. The goal of this sign repair was to make the painting more visible at street level so that it can remain for another 90 years.



Scott's Dairy

891 Main

891 Main Street currently houses Something Sweet, which inspired the connection to the historic Antioch business, Scott's Dairy.

Walter Scott owned and operated Scott's Dairy in Antioch for many years before working as the Superintendent of Public Works and a trustee for the Village. In 1951, he became Chief of Police of Antioch, where he remained until his retirement in 1963.

The first building at 891 Main Street was lost in the 1903 fire and contained a restaurant and bakery. The new brick building housed shoe sales for the first fifty years of its existence—Chicago Footwear Company, Rhodes' Shoes, Antioch Shoe Shop, and Darnaby's Shoes to name a few. The store once had a fluoroscopic x-ray machine that showed people the bones of their feet while wearing shoes to check the fit. It was later removed after the dangers of radiation were realized.

Other businesses that were housed here include a fine gift shop called The General Store, a children's clothing store named Choosey Child, Village Stitchery, and now Something Sweet. In 1997, it was the building awarded with the "Chicago's Finest Painted Lady Competition" for the commercial buildings category for the Northwest suburbs.

American Legion Restores Tank

For former Antioch Village Board member Jay Jozwiak, restoration of the veteran's memorial at Toft and Orchard has been on his mind for years. Earlier this year, Jozwiak, who serves as the Commander of the Antioch American Legion Post 748, brought a group of volunteers together to make the restoration a reality.

The tank memorial has been in place since 1994 when the United States government donated a Vietnam-era M551 Sheridan Tank to the Antioch VFW. Local, state, and federal officials worked together to secure the tank, including former State Senator Adeline Geo-Karis, State Representative Robert Churchill, and Congressman Phil Crane. The tank was delivered and placed on the concrete slab in December 1994. The memorial was dedicated the following spring, on Memorial Day. Dignitaries attending the spring dedication included then Illinois State Treasurer Judy Baar Topinka.

This past summer, Jozwiak enlisted the help of other local veterans, veteran groups, and local businesses to help with a restoration project of the tank. The group of volunteers spent about 300 hours working to power wash the tank, sand it, prime and paint the exterior, and repaint the

tank's tracks and rims (a very tedious job!). The group finished the first phase of the restoration of the tank shortly before Halloween. The group is already planning Phase II of the project, which they expect to begin in Spring 2023. The next phase will involve making improvements to the area surrounding the concrete base and adding memorials to honor veterans from the Antioch area who gave their lives in combat. The current memorial honors those who died during World War II.

The restoration of the tank was made possible through the efforts of members of the Antioch American Legion 748, Jay Jozwiak, Bill Lindemann, Jim Hovel, Daniel Jedynak, Tim Knutson, Jr., Antioch VFW Commander Paul Swan-

son, and donations from the American Legion Post 748, VFW Post 4551, VFW Auxiliary, Antioch Ace Hardware, Impressions Count, Troop Contracting, and Bruce from Stateline Sign.

Winter Weather Notice

Wintertime can bring along heavy snowfall and difficulty navigating the roadways or sidewalks. Heavy snowfall can also be an issue with mailboxes and snow at the end of driveways.

While mailboxes need to be far enough off the road that they won't be hit by cars, they need to be close enough so mail carriers can reach them without leaving their trucks. Most often, it's not the mailbox placement or the snowplow that causes havoc, it's the snow itself.

If snow is wet and heavy, the force of the snow coming off the snowplow can be strong enough to dent a mailbox, loosen a post, or if already weathered or old, cause a break. Slick roadways and hazardous conditions can also bring about a hit to a mailbox from any type of vehicle.

"Our snowplow drivers are careful to avoid mailboxes. Most often, it's the weight of snow thrown from the plows that cause damage to mailboxes with weak supports," said Director of Public Works, Dennis Heimbrodt. "That's why we recommend you take a look at your mailbox and keep it in good condition."

If the Village causes damage to the mailbox or post with a direct hit from the plow, the Village will reimburse the homeowner up to seventy-five dollars if the mailbox cannot be reasonably replaced or repaired by the Public Works Department.

To give your mailbox some extra TLC this winter, consider these simple steps:

- Clear the area in front of your mailbox to ensure mail delivery and reduce the amount of snow coming off the plow.
- Place a small piece of reflective tape on the mailbox to help all drivers see it at night
- Remove snow from around your mailbox but avoid throwing snow back onto the roadway.
- Inspect your mailbox. Make sure it is securely mounted to the post and firmly supported in the ground.
- If replacing your mailbox, consider the purchase of a heavy-duty mailbox to meet your needs.


Teachers & Staff Enjoy Bond Fire


I am thrilled to join the Township Team as the new Director of Community Senior Services.

Lake Villa 41 Schools are Commendable

The Illinois Report Card is an annual report released by the Illinois State Board of Education that shows how the state, and each school and district, are progressing on a wide range of educational goals. The Report Card offers a complete picture of student and school performance to inform and empower families and communities as they support their local schools.

Schools receive an annual summative designation on the Illinois Report Card. The designation is based on the school's overall data for all of the accountability indicators, as well as the data for individual student groups. We are pleased this year that all four Lake Villa 41 schools maintained their summative ranking of Commendable.

Lake Villa 41 prides itself on routinely evaluating curriculum resources. Staff review effective interventions for individual students. District data has shown positive shifts in student achievement from a 'large gap' per the kindergarten entry assessment, KIDS Assessment, to a range of 'small to moderate gap' per the Illinois Assessment of Readiness. Learning measures were enhanced, and strategic measures took place to respond to learning gaps.


