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



What are you most excited about for leading District 41?

As a member of the school community for over two decades, the students, their families, and the staff are, what I consider, an extension of my family. It is an honor and a privilege to be able to serve each of them.

In preparation for my transition into the superintendent role, I have engaged a variety of stakeholders in our efforts to ELEVATE District 41.

- ◆ Lake Villa District 41 is a 'Leader in Me' school district, where students and staff practice Steven Covey's 7 Habits of Highly Effective People. The Leader in Me Lighthouse teams are preparing for movement towards Lighthouse status.
- ◆ The District Math Curriculum Committee will pilot two math resources this fall. We are excited to evaluate the engaging, hands-on, and higher-level learning that students will experience through these pilots.
- Our Kindergarten through 2nd Grade English Language Arts (ELA) curriculum was re-aligned to include explicit, systematic phonemic awareness and phonics instruction by incorporating two curricular resources: Heggerty and UFLI.
- And, we will be refining our Professional Learning Community Practices to ensure that we are functioning at the highest level for the betterment of our students.

What are your goals for District 41?

I am eager to ELEVATE District 41 in 2023 and beyond! It is our mission to achieve excellence by empowering and inspiring students to learn, lead, and serve. To achieve that end, this fall stakeholders are invited to share their voice in creating a Lake Villa District 41 Portrait of a Graduate. Our Portrait of a Graduate will represent our vision for the skills and character traits students need to succeed in college, career, and life.



How will your background as an educator at the District help you in your new role as superintendent?

Serving in a variety of roles within Lake Villa District 41 has given me the benefit of multiple perspectives. I have the vantage point of being a general education teacher, special education teacher, and teacher assistant during my early years as well as the perspective of an assistant principal, principal, and assistant superintendent. It is my hope that having this multi-lens will serve the Lake Villa District 41 students and the community as a whole.

Summer Events Full of Milestones

s we move from summer into fall, I am grateful for the fun we had in Antioch over the past few months. We started the summer season with a successful Summer Wine Walk and It's Thursday summer concert series kick-off concert with country music star Rodney Atkins! Our Food Truck FEASTival continued this summer, bringing large crowds downtown to Toft Avenue once a month in June, July, and August. In July, we partnered with 93XRT radio to bring three nights of music to the William Brooks Entertainment Center for three nights of music at the bandshell. We've never hosted anything quite like this event. It proved to be a fun three nights of music, providing entertainment, and bringing exposure to downtown Antioch. I had a chance to meet many people visiting Antioch for the first time during the weekend.

Our village staff worked hard to make these events more exciting for residents and visitors. This summer, we added a new position at Village Hall, which is responsible for working with existing and potential Antioch businesses, plus this person (Business Development Manager) oversees special events in our community that are designed to help spur commerce in our community. I expect the quantity and quality of our community programming to only get better with our increased staffing and focus on events.

We also hit a major milestone this summer with our groundbreaking ceremony for the redevelopment project of the village-owned property at Main Street and Orchard. When completed, this parkland will not only be a beautiful and enjoyable resource for residents of Antioch, but it will also act as an economic stimulus for downtown, attracting



visitors to the splash pad, inclusive playground, entertainment space, and various events that will be planned for the space. Plus, the land will be redeveloped in a way to address flooding and waterway issues with Sequoit Creek.

Finally, this summer, the village communications staff started publishing my weekly community updates on the Village's website and Facebook page. If you haven't started following these already, please look for them. They're published every Friday, with an archive available by using the #antiochmayorsupdate and #antiochmayorsmessage hashtags.

I look forward to seeing you around town this fall! Remember, shop local!

Blighted property to be redeveloped into park space, with an exposed creek waterway, performance space, splash pad, and inclusive playground

Before a crowd of residents, community stakeholders, and current and former elected officials, Village of Antioch Mayor Scott Gartner led a ground-breaking ceremony that has been anticipated by the Antioch community for years. Earlier this morning, the ceremony marked the beginning of the construction to redevelop land near the downtown business district that had been vacant and blighted for years. When finished, the village's newest parkland will have a splash pad, an accessible playground, a beautiful public performance space featuring an el-

egant gazebo, and a concession area

re-exposed Sequoit Creek. The updates to

the creek add beautiful aesthetics, plus flood

Antioch Mayor Scott J. Gartner commemorated the day as another "giant step" forward in the transformation of downtown Antioch. The completion of the project is expected in the summer of 2024.

"This development project will provide a major boost in tourism and economic development opportunities for the Village of Antioch, while also addressing stormwater management issues and preserving natural open space in our community," said Gartner. "This blighted piece of property will soon be transformed into a beautiful community space that will be a year-round attraction for visitors to our downtown business district."

Roughly 50 years ago, this area of Sequoit Creek was fitted with a 102" metal culvert and was buried to make way for a commercial auto dealership development. Over time, the businesses left, the culvert detreated, and the village

worked to acquire all of the parcels that make up this property. By 2019, the culvert completely failed,

creating a blighted eyesore. The failed culvert also impaired the flow of the creek, presenting both a general flooding

hazard for downtown and a threat of flooding for upstream properties.

In 2021, after acquiring the remainder of the property, the Village engaged the Lakota Group, a planning and landscape architecture firm, to seek the Antioch community's feedback as to the final use and redevelopment of the property. With community input, the Lakota Group and Strand Associates Engineering produced detailed construction plans for the redevelopment of the property as an open space

with an exposed or daylighted Sequoit Creek.

In May of this year, the Antioch Village Board selected Boller Construction Company as the winning bidder for the \$12.5 million project. Financing for the project comes in part from American Recovery Plan Act funding (ARPA) - \$1.9 million, Stormwater Management Commission grant - \$2.75 million, with the remainder of the funds from Alternate Revenue Source General Obligation Bonds. These bonds will be repaid by Business District sales tax revenue, without creating an additional tax burden for village property owners.

This Project is supported, in whole or in part, by federal award number SLT 3381 awarded to the State of Illinois by the U.S. Department of the Treasury.

TechSmart Pilots Computer Science for Students

TechSmart is a new course we are piloting in the 2022-23 school year with a curriculum pathway that will have a seamless sequence of rigorous courses in coding and computer science. The course contributes to an overall set of standards-based outcomes in coding and computer science. Students will be introduced to computer science fundamentals towards mastery of the professional line-based

languages (including Python) and industry technologies (HTML, JavaScript, CSS) necessary to compete for jobs in the coding industry.

TechSmart's pathway is designed from the ground up to provide not only the skills students need, but the certification and portfolio to prove it. We had staff trained this summer in the TechSmart curriculum.






Eagles Celebrate Twenty Years

Making Fun Accessible for All

uring the 2022-2023 school year, Antioch CCSD 34 administration initiated a plan to revamp our playgrounds, aiming to provide enhanced opportunities and experiences for all our children. Our primary objective is to ensure that every student has access to play and explore stimulating environments. Our vision is to create inclusive and sensory-rich playgrounds, fostering an enjoyable leisure space for all the kids to share. This undertaking reflects our commitment to supporting the well-being and happiness of our students. For our children with special needs, we do not want them to travel outside their community to access parks that are appropriate for them. We want them to play and learn here, at their school, with their friends. It is important that all our kids have a place to learn and a place to play together.

Our first step in accomplishing this plan has been to add inclusive equipment to our elementary playgrounds. Some of the pieces we added are:

Momentum Corridor

The Momentum Corridor provides a unique rolling experience with overhead bars where kids are able to pull themselves across the full length of a roller table. They can enjoy a tactile event with gentle bumps. The Momentum Corridor is at transfer height, making it an accessible piece of equipment on our playground. The Momentum Corridor also provides students with Sensory Play experiences through Proprioceptive Input (knowing exactly where their body parts are and how to plan their movements), and Tactile Stimulation (activation of their sensory touch stimulus).

Ten Spin

The Ten Spin is designed to accommodate a group of up to 10 children simultaneously, promoting inclusivity by allowing kids of all abilities to participate in the fun, whether

they choose to sit, kneel, or stand. This freestanding product fosters a sense of togetherness and enables children of various abilities to play together. Moreover, it offers a crucial sensory experience that aids in child development by engaging the Vestibular system. This system plays a significant role in our perception of body position concerning gravity, movement, and balance.

Dynamics Lab

The Dynamics Lab lets kids experiment with motion—from the Pin Impression to the Jingle Drum, kids will love exploring movement while making new friends. Dynamics Lab is a piece of equipment that gives kids the opportunity to test out the basic laws of mechanics in an exciting play setting, with a focus on special education and STEM. The Dynamics Lab provides Sensory Play experiences through Auditory Input (detecting vibrations and changes in the pressure in the ear), Proprioceptive Input (knowing exactly where their body parts are and how to plan their movements), and Tactile Stimulation (activation of their sensory touch stimulus), and Visual Input (detecting images of visible lights and recognize varying colors, hues, and brightness).

As we continue the expansion of our playgrounds, our next step is to transition the ground from mulch to a surface that is fit for all children and adults with physical needs; wheelchair accessibility is important so that all of our children can have an inviting and enjoyable experience in their neighborhoods where they can explore their world, and develop motor skills, physical strength, and cognitive functioning. Looking ahead, we will partner with parents, students, staff, and community partners to plan for and solicit ideas regarding the possibility of expanding our playgrounds. We will intentionally select designs so children of all ages and abilities can play, be challenged, and have fun together.



MKM Early Learning Center Welcomes New Principal

pproved as the new principal of Mary Kay McNeill Early Learning Center at the June 20, 2023 Antioch CCSD 34 Board of Education meeting, Mrs. Gardner was warmly welcomed to D34 by teachers and administrators. Of his newest team member, D34 Superintendent Aron Borowiak shared, "Nikki Gardner's experience leading a preschool, combined with her exceptional knowledge of the development of students from birth until 5, preschool curriculum, and instructional strategies separated her from the pack of candidates that applied for the position."

Mrs. Gardner's goal is to always lead with authenticity, grace and kindness, and she is looking forward to joining D34 and serving as the principal of Mary Kay McNeill Early Learning Center.

Prior to joining D34, Mrs. Gardner served the students and families of Harvard Community Unit School District 50 for four years as the Principal of Washington School. While in this role, Mrs. Gardner oversaw the successful implementation of a tiered social emotional support system for preschool students. The Pyramid Model, amongst other programs she implemented, were recognized as gold quality

standard for Pre-K and the school's Birth to 3 program received recognition as a Blue Ribbon Affiliate program. Mrs. Gardner is excit-

ed to be bringing the Pyramid Model to MKM ELC this school year, sharing, "The Pyramid Model is age-appropriate and helps students to regulate emotions and behaviors prior to entering kindergarten, which will lead to less interventions." Passionate about early childhood education, Mrs. Gardner is a strong advocate for the implementation of inclusionary practices as a means to improve student learning oppor-

tunities and helping the youngest learners thrive in their foundational experiences.

As she prepares for the upcoming school year, Mrs. Gardner is looking forward to building relationships with staff, students and families of MKM Early Learning Center. "I am really excited to become a part of D34. My focus as principal of MKM Early Learning Center is to build quality relationships with staff, students, and families. As a member of the ELC team, I will ensure each student and their learning needs are supported."

Inspiring to Dream: AUGS Undergoes Renovations

The dream of an updated Antioch Upper Grade School has become a reality. Construction began in late May with an ambitious timeline that included the renovation of more than two-thirds of the original school from the 1970s, turning the dated facilities into a modern learning space that promotes collaboration, flexibility, comfort, and safety.

The renovations will provide a happier and more engaging place for students to learn and for teachers and staff to work. Updates will make it easier to take advantage of the new technology available to students and teachers and will provide a safer environment by enhancing accommodations for those with physical disabilities.

New classroom furniture includes tables and chairs that are easier for students to access comfortably and to move in order to meet the instructional needs of a lesson. Principal Joe Koeune notes, "Research tells us that students need opportunities to collaborate and work in groups of a variety of sizes and the flexible furniture will make it easier for our classes to move and adjust seating arrangements." The new tile, paint, ceiling lights, student desks, chairs, and storage will create

a comfortable learning space for both the students and staff.

The mobile furniture allows for quick transitions for grouping and class activities permitting more opportunities to collaborate. Each classroom has a standard layout that includes white boards on both sides of a newly installed Promethean board in order to provide more teaching and learning space.

Safety and accessibility were key components to the renova-

tions. Bathrooms and locker rooms now meet the current standard in design and are ADA compliant. The main entrance redesign will provide a more secure entry into the school for visitors, while the bleachers in the gym have been replaced and are now ADA compliant for students, staff and guests. Additionally, plumbing, electrical infrastructure, fire alarm system and emergency back-up lighting all have been updated.

While funding for the renovation included work on items such as plumbing and electrical work, upgrading this work will save the district time and money in repairs over time.

In total, the full renovation included the updating of 25 classrooms, four locker rooms and seven restrooms, the installation of new bleachers, white boards and Promethean boards, the painting of nine additional classrooms, staff offices and hallways, and life safety updates throughout the building.

United in Learning

New Community Partnership for Antioch CCSD 34

United Way of Lake County's mission is to unite leadership and resources to create lasting change that will improve and save lives in Lake County, Illinois. Summer 2023 brought a new community partnership and resource to Antioch CCSD 34. United Way of Lake County joined the district to offer one of their programs called Kindergarten Countdown Camp. Antioch CCSD 34 is proud of this newly established community partnership with United Way of Lake County and looks forward to continuing and extending United Way of Lake County's resources to Antioch CCSD 34 families and community.

What is Kindergarten Countdown Camp?

Kindergarten Countdown Camp is a free learning opportunity for qualifying incoming kindergarten students. The goal is to provide students with no or very limited preschool exposure an opportunity to prepare for Kindergarten. By eliminating barriers such as transportation, hunger through free snacks, and school supplies to learn, the focus is on basic academic skills such as letters in one's name, colors, fine and gross motor, basic school routines such as sitting on the carpet as well as social emotional and peer relations skills.

What did the students experience when participating in Kindergarten Countdown Camp?

Antioch CCSD 34 Kindergarten Countdown Camp took place at W.C. Petty Elementary School from June 5th-June 29th during the annual Antioch CCSD 34 summer learning programming. Students worked with a team of three adults, which included an Antioch CCSD 34 classroom teacher and paraprofessional, as well as a United Way Kindergarten Countdown Camp Coordinator, who helped the students with their daily learning and routines. A rich learning environment conducive to the young learners from the size of the furniture to the tactile learning experiences in the classroom were provided. The students also were exposed to and learned how to load, ride and unload on a school bus which is an important skill set as well.

Why does Kindergarten Countdown Camp matter?

Kindergarten Countdown Camp makes a difference in the



lives of incoming Kindergarten students. Using the pre and post assessment data collected by the United Way Kindergarten Countdown Camp Coordinator, there is evidence that the exposure and experience made an academic difference for these students. This fall we are eagerly awaiting to see these students arrive in the classroom with a little more confidence and familiarity to school routines. The readiness skills learned in Kindergarten Countdown Camp will enable the students to adjust to their full time kindergarten day with confidence and perhaps even be a leader for others.

istrict 41 staff participated in professional development opportunities this past summer focusing on the Science of Reading, Mathematics Progressions, Engagement Strategies, and a revised K-2nd Grade English Language Arts Scope and Sequence integrating explicit and systematic instruction in phonemic awareness and phonics. Other offerings included English Learners Strategies, Progress Monitoring, UFLI, CPI, and Information Text Strategies training sessions.

District 41 utilized the remainder of referendum bonds to supplement various summer 2023 facility improvements. 
